

Jo is a senior clinical sonographer, sonographer educator in the Emergency Department and clinical lecturer for the PoCUS programme at The University of Otago, Department of General Practice and Rural Health. She is President of ASUM and an Administrative Councillor for the World Federation for Ultrasound in Medicine and Biology (WFUMB). Jo is a past chair of both ASUM NZ and the DMU Board of Examiners and has examined for several ultrasound programmes.

Jo has presented both nationally and internationally on a range of topics and has a keen interest in all areas of the ultrasound profession including professional standards, targeted ultrasound protocols and the evaluation of acute patients along with the growing field of Point of Care Ultrasound. Jo volunteers for several Outreach programmes and teaches extensively throughout the Pacific for ASUM Outreach, WFUMB, RAD-AID South Pacific and PEARLS. She has received several awards including ASUM Volunteer of Year and was recently named the 2024 ASA NZ Sonographer of the Year.



Alison is a general sonographer with a key interest in obstetric and gynaecological ultrasound from Adelaide, South Australia. Her vast clinical experience spans both metropolitan and regional centres; public hospitals and radiology private practice, as well as specialist obstetric and gynaecological centres. Karen is an Obstetrician Gynaecologist working in both a private dedicated women's ultrasound practice and as a Senior Staff Specialist in Fetal Medicine. Karen works with two different groups of dedicated conscientious colleagues who have helped her understand that medicine and ultrasound can be expertly practiced in different ways and that one rule does not fit all.

Prof Gillian Whalley

Gillian has been involved with cardiac ultrasound since 1985, first as a sonographer and then as a research scientist after completing her Masters (1995) and PhD (2006) both in clinical use of echocardiography. She has published over 200 peer-reviewed publications and her clinical research has included ultrasound (heart and vascular) linked to patient outcomes. Gillian is passionate about showing the clinical benefits of ultrasound through quality research and equitable access to appropriate ultrasound. She has volunteered in resourcelimited communities to screen for rheumatic heart disease and her recent research is focused on ethnic disparity in the guideline-driven approach to echocardiography. Gillian is currently a Professor of Sonography and Cardiology at the University of Otago in Dunedin, New Zealand. She serves as the Editor-in-Chief of ASUM's peer-reviewed journal, Australasian Journal of Ultrasound in Medicine (AJUM).



Jody is a public affairs professional and Managing Director of Insight Strategy. He has over 30 years' experience spanning over ten years working in Federal politics and the balance working in the private sector. As a public affairs professional he has provided advice to many major corporates encompassing government relations, public affairs, issues management, stakeholder relations, and campaign advice. # President's Report

### Jo McCann

Tēnā koutou e hoa mā,

It is with great pride and optimism that I present my first President's Report for the Australasian Society for Ultrasound in Medicine (ASUM).

The mission of ASUM, to foster a collaborative multidisciplinary community of health professionals who deliver ultrasound excellence, continues to guide our every decision as we work towards maximising our relevance, sustainability, and impact within the ultrasound community across Australia and New Zealand.

This year has been transformational for ASUM. We have not only addressed several operational challenges but have emerged stronger, more innovative, and more globally connected than before. The strategic initiatives implemented this year have positioned ASUM as a leader in ultrasound education and collaboration, while our commitment to operational efficiency has significantly reduced our overall loss, providing a positive outlook for a more financially sustainable future.

### **Strategy and Change**

The year began with the crucial task of recruiting a CEO, and I am delighted to welcome Trish Manten, whose appointment marked a fresh chapter for ASUM. The recruitment process was thorough and strategic, ensuring we found a leader who not only shares our vision for the future but brings the financial acumen and operational expertise to support ASUM for the future.

A major milestone was the development of the 2025-2028 strategic plan. The framework positions ASUM for sustainable growth while maintaining our commitment to excellence. The strategic plan emphasises our commitment to delivering on our mission of international collaboration, educational innovation, relevance for members and financial sustainability ensuring ASUM's future as a strong and resilient organisation.

Our Board composition continues to reflect our multidisciplinary commitment, and I have found immense value in working alongside professionals from diverse ultrasound specialties supported by Independent Directors. This breadth of experience has been particularly valuable as we navigate our international collaborations and develop partnerships that span multiple clinical disciplines.

#### **Education for all**

Education remains the cornerstone of ASUM's mission, and this year has seen growth and innovation across all



our educational offerings. Building on the record number of enrolments achieved in 2023/24, we have implemented one of the most significant operational changes in ASUM's history. That is, the removal of the requirement for ASUM membership for participation in our education programmes. This transformative decision reflects our fundamental belief that excellence in ultrasound education should be accessible to all healthcare professionals, regardless of their ability to maintain multiple professional memberships. By removing membership barriers and increasing ease of access for individual practitioners and healthcare institutions, we have opened our educational offerings to a broader community of learners who can benefit from ASUM's expertise, whilst members benefit from access to a broader community of professionals, reiterating our unique position as a multidisciplinary association.

The ASUM Certificate in Clinician Performed Ultrasound (CCPU) programme has experienced another year of growth, with enrolments exceeding last year's record numbers. The Certificate in Allied Health Performed Ultrasound (CAHPU) has similarly flourished, demonstrating the demand for high-quality ultrasound education across healthcare disciplines.

The Diploma of Diagnostic Ultrasound (DDU) programme has undergone significant enhancement with the successful return to in-person assessments. This decision, made after consideration of educational outcomes along with examiner and candidate feedback, ensures that our qualification standards remain rigorous. The transition back to in-person assessments was well received, with positive feedback from both candidates and assessors.

#### **Connect with Peers**

Auckland provided another outstanding venue for our community to gather for ASUMNZ. The conference was a

resounding success, showcasing the strength and vibrancy of our New Zealand community while providing an excellent platform for knowledge sharing and professional networking. The positive feedback from attendees highlighted not only the quality of the scientific programme but the value of peer-to-peer connection.

ASUM24 held in Brisbane continued this momentum. The conference featured multiple streams, allowing us to cater to our diverse membership while maintaining the high-quality, evidence-based content that defines our events. The breadth of local and international presenters, spanning multiple disciplines and representing both established experts and emerging voices, created an exceptional learning environment that embodies our multi-disciplinary mission.

The feedback from both conferences was overwhelmingly positive, with praise for the practical workshops, the diversity of topics, and the networking opportunities that allowed our community to connect and collaborate. The success of both events sets an excellent foundation as we look ahead to conferences of the future.

ASUM25 was held in mid-October in Te Whanganui-a-Tara Wellington, Aotearoa New Zealand. This location symbolises our commitment to our trans-Tasman membership and our recognition of the vital contributions our Aotearoa New Zealand colleagues make to the ASUM community. Wellington's vibrant cultural scene and stunning natural beauty provided an inspiring backdrop for another exceptional conference with strong interest from both our traditional membership base and new participants drawn by our expanded educational offerings, keynote speakers and international partnerships.

### **Operational Efficiency for Growth**

I am pleased to report that the Board's focused attention on financial sustainability has yielded substantial results. The operational review has been fully implemented by the incoming CEO, resulting in a fit for purpose organisation that efficiently delivers maximum value to our members and stakeholders.

### **ASUM Outreach and Global Partnerships**

Perhaps one of the most significant developments this year has been ASUM's expanded international reach and our commitment to global health equity through ultrasound education and support. These opportunities arise through our new partnership with Radiology Across Borders (RAB) as well as through the World Federation of Ultrasound and Medicine in Biology (WFUMB) and RAD-AID International.

Our partnership with Radiology Across Borders (RAB) significantly expands our outreach opportunities and capacity to make a global impact. This alliance opens new avenues for ASUM members to contribute their expertise to communities worldwide, while gaining invaluable experience in global health and cross-cultural medical practice. The partnership

aligns perfectly with ASUM's mission of fostering excellence in ultrasound practice and extends our reach to communities that can benefit most from our collective expertise.

Our partnership with RAD-AID International has enabled ASUM Outreach to extend our educational expertise and support to Pacific Island nations, specifically Tonga, Cook Islands, and Vanuatu. Our pilot education programme, The Certificate of Fundamental Ultrasound - Biliary has been particularly successful, with thirteen radiographers in Vanuatu and eight Tongan radiographers enrolled in the programme, with three participants from the Cook Islands soon to commence. This initiative embodies ASUM Outreach's commitment to improving health outcomes across the Pacific region and demonstrates the practical impact of international collaboration in medical education.

#### **WFUMB**

ASUM's global influence extends beyond our direct partnerships. I am proud to report that Professor George Condous, ASUM Past President, is the current President of WFUMB. In addition, ASUM Board members serve on WFUMB's committees, contributing Australian and New Zealand expertise to global ultrasound standards and practices. This involvement ensures that our perspectives and innovations reach an international audience while allowing us to stay current with global developments in our field.

Our international presence was further highlighted when ASUM members were invited speakers at the WFUMB Congress in Kyoto, Japan. This recognition of our expertise on the world stage reflects the high regard in which ASUM is held internationally and reinforces our position as leaders in ultrasound education and practice.

Our membership of WFUMB continues to deliver valuable educational opportunities for ASUM members that many would not otherwise have the chance to experience.

### Our valued volunteers, staff, partners and sponsors

As I conclude this report, I must acknowledge the many individuals who make ASUM's success possible. Our CEO, Trish Manten, has shown commendable commitment to understanding the sector and working with the team, sponsors, and volunteers. # CEO's Report

It is my privilege to present this year's CEO Report, my first since joining ASUM. This inaugural year has been one of deep learning, purposeful change, and strong collaboration. I have had the privilege of engaging with our members, partners, and staff to understand what we do best and where we can grow stronger. Together, we have taken significant steps to modernise our systems, refine our governance, strengthen compliance, and reshape our organisation to meet the evolving needs of the organisation and the sector.

As a new CEO, my focus has been on listening, stabilising, and positioning ASUM for long-term success. This has meant balancing transformation with continuity, honouring our proud history while taking deliberate action to ensure we remain relevant, agile, and trusted into the future.

### Year in Review — Highlights

**Strategy and Purpose:** developed with the Board a new strategic plan for implementation in the upcoming financial year, one focused on long-term sustainability and relevance for the organisation.

**Education & Training:** Reviewed curriculum governance, expanded digital learning workflows to support candidate experience, and elevated quality and consistency across programs.

**Organisational Restructure:** Simplified operating model; clarified accountabilities; introduced new leadership roles to drive delivery and stewardship.

**Stakeholder Engagement:** Strengthened relationships with members, partners, and regulators; co-designed initiatives and shared value projects

#### **Investment in operational transformation**

This year, the ASUM team has been committed to commencing the implementation of several digital transformation projects across all areas of the operational back office. All projects supporting more efficient ways of work, enhanced corporate governance and continuous improvement review policies and procedures.

A restructure of the team has supported ASUM's ability to invest in education with a focus on the development of both education programs and CPD.



### **Stakeholder Engagement**

Throughout the year, I have had the privilege of meeting and engaging with a broad range of internal and external stakeholders, each bringing valuable perspectives that have shaped our direction and priorities. These conversations have reinforced the importance of collaboration, transparency, and shared purpose.

By actively listening and engaging, we have gained insights that have informed our strategic roadmap for the year ahead. # Finance Report

### Jody Fassina, Chair of the Finance, Audit, Risk and Investment Committee

The financial year 2024/2 5 was a year of reset and change for ASUM. The new CEO, Trish Manten, joined in November 2024, followed by an organisational restructure to support ASUM to move into the future.

Key investments in governance and operational reviews were completed in early 2025 to support the preparation of changes in new financial pricing structures for members and non-members to be implemented at the start of the new financial year.

Operational activities to support administrative efficiencies included the migration from MYOB to Xero, the commencement of the migration to the new membership database which is due to be finalised in FY26.

The financial year operating result was ahead of the budgeted expectations with loss of (\$59,871).

Total revenue from all sources (not including ASUM Outreach) in 2024/25 was A\$2,280,404 comprised of membership dues of A\$1,020,391, education activities including conferences and CPD events A\$1,099,848, investment/interest income A\$135,281 and other income of A\$24,884.


ASUM's membership remains strong and in early 2025 we welcomed our first Affiliated Organisation Members to the ASUM community with further growth in this areas expected for FY26.

FARIC remain prudent and focused on support ASUM to deliver its new strategic initiatives.









### **Supporting Members Through Strong Educational Governance**







# Australasian Journal of Ultrasound in Medicine (AJUM) Report

### **Prof Gillian Whalley**

AJUM provides educational and professional development opportunities for our members and the broader ultrasound community and as such fulfils one of ASUM's missions, to foster a collaborative multi-disciplinary community of highly competent health professionals who deliver ultrasound excellence. We hope that through AJUM we also contribute to another of ASUM's strategic aims to build a strong future for members and deliver evidence-based standards and research. To do this, our journal must publish articles of the highest quality and of interest to our readers. All indicators this year suggest we are on our way to reaching that goal.

In 2024, we saw an increase of 50% in submissions. This means our editorial team have been working harder than ever and we are grateful for their volunteer service. In 2023, we published 34 journal articles, of which, half came from colleagues in Australia and New Zealand. Submissions to AJUM once again reached a new high, and as a result, the rejection rate has increased. We currently accept only 27.4% of the submitted manuscripts: competition is tough. Of those that are rejected, the majority are rejected without review, often within a week or two. Authors value this as an early decision that allows them to resubmit elsewhere. Early rejection also reduces the burden on our peer reviewers with papers that may never meet the threshold for publication. But it also means that when papers are sent to peer review, the acceptance rate is higher: it's usually worth the wait for authors. In 2024, we invited 248 peer reviewers to help us and thankfully 125 accepted the invitation.

Our time to early view online, an important measure for our authors, has reduced slightly to 32 days (from 34 days in 2023), which means once we have the final accepted manuscript, authors can see their paper relatively quickly. Our biggest challenge to the timeline is finding suitable peer reviewers due to competing demands on everyone's time. The AJUM editors have been focussed on reducing the time to first decision, and this has been reduced to 57 days (median) for articles that are sent out to peer review (down from 67 in 2023). We anticipate this to reduce further as we move away from publishing issues (or bundles of papers) - we now publish the final version as they are finalised, meaning readers have earlier access to the

latest research in our journal.

Through Wiley, AJUM has established transfer arrangements with several international imaging journals. Papers submitted through this process go through the full peer review unless they have already been peer-reviewed by the first journal, in which case our editorial board members make decisions based

on those peer reviews. Through this process our international content (and international reach) has increased significantly. On of the international measures of journal success, CiteScore, is continuing to trend upwards, increasing from 1.9 in 2022 to 2.1 in 2024. This is a measure of how many citations there are as a proportion of articles we publish and reflects the increased reach of our journal.

Together, with our publisher Wiley, we are committed to open access publishing and many of our authors have taken advantage of agreements such as one established with the Council of Australian University Librarians (CAUL) that allows authors from most university libraries across Australia and New Zealand to publish in an open access format at no cost. For authors affiliated with these universities, their publications in AJUM are open access and free to read and download anywhere in the world, provided they use their affiliated university address. In 2023, 40% were published as open access, compared with 30% in 2023, and 29% in 2022, resulting in wider readership outside of traditional libraries that hold

subscriptions. Our partnership with Wiley has also improved the visibility of AJUM internationally, with over 85% of readership outside Australasia reassuring us that AJUM articles and our journal have wide international appeal. In 2023, around 230,000 articles were downloaded, of which only 15% were downloaded in Australia and New Zealand. The largest downloads by country were the USA (21%), India (15%), UK (5%) and China (15%).

As always, we are most grateful to the authors who choose AJUM as a trusted publication platform for their research, case studies, education pieces and reviews. In the background are multiple volunteer peer reviewers and the staff at both ASUM and Wiley that pull everything together. The work of selecting the peer reviewers and ultimately the papers we


# Standards of Practice Report

ASUM provides standards across all disciplines of diagnostic ultrasound. We work closely with local and international professional organisations to deliver on expected standards and guidance. External consultation requests have continued to increase with the benefit of transparency provided by ASUM Connect, allowing for collaborative discussions and feedback.

### Strengthening Our Advocacy for Excellence in Ultrasound

Throughout the 2024–2025 financial year, ASUM continued to strengthen its voice as the leading advocate for excellence, safety and integrity in medical ultrasound practice across Australasia. Central to our advocacy this year was a strong public campaign for greater protection and recognition of the sonography profession.





In June 2025, ASUM called on the Australian Government to introduce title protection for "sonographer" and implement national registration and regulatory oversight of ultrasound services. This advocacy was driven by growing concern over the proliferation of non-diagnostic and unregulated "reassurance" scans being performed outside of medical settings, particularly in obstetric care. ASUM highlighted the



potential risks these services pose to patient safety, including misdiagnosis, false reassurance, and delayed access to clinical care

#### **Updating Infection Control Standards and Guidelines**

The ASUM ACIPC Guidelines for Reprocessing Ultrasound Transducers are being reviewed. They will be updated to incorporate the latest evidence and align with AS 5369:2023, released by Standards Australia. Guidelines and standards remain a priority for creating healthier lives for all by driving ultrasound excellence.

### Member Consultation and Collaboration via ASUM Connect

By utilising ASUM Connect to facilitate consultations, we have successfully encouraged participation from a wide range of



individuals and received valuable feedback and comments that inform our ASUM response. Consultation was also sought across the sector, and the Guidelines are due to be submitted for peer review via AJUM late 2025.

### **Maintaining and Expanding Standards of Practice**

In parallel, ASUM continued to champion the highest standards of ultrasound practice. The Society maintained and expanded its comprehensive Standards of Practice directory, which remains a cornerstone resource for clinicians and educators across all ultrasound disciplines. This work involves a periodic review of internal guidelines and the integration of key international and national reference documents to ensure consistency with best practices.



#### **Active Engagement in National Consultations**

ASUM continues to participate actively in external consultations to advance the quality, safety and accessibility of ultrasound services, with a clear focus on enhancing patient care outcomes. ASUM regularly engages with government departments, professional bodies, and regulatory agencies to ensure that the voice of the ultrasound community is represented in policy development and healthcare planning.

### **Collaboration with the Department of Health**

ASUM meets frequently with the Australian Department of Health to collaborate on key issues affecting diagnostic imaging, workforce development, and regulation. These meetings provide opportunities to advocate on behalf of members, promote equitable access to ultrasound across metropolitan and regional areas, and contribute to the design of policies that safeguard patients while supporting clinical innovation.

#### PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

ASUM provides ongoing education, events and standards across all disciplines of diagnostic ultrasound. The group aims to achieve its objectives through the provision of educational programs. The Diploma in Diagnostic Ultrasound, Certificate in Clinical Performed Ultrasound and Certificate in Allied Health Performed Ultrasound continue to provide positive outcomes to impact patient care. Diversification of education courses continues under each of the aforementioned programs.

The group sets standards for the provision of ultrasound across multiple disciplines while providing education to support these standards. ASUM continues to provide guidelines and advice on clinical education and recommendations, introducing new guidelines to support parent-centred communication in obstetric ultrasound. This aims to improve transparency across the healthcare continuum and remove value-laden language to help both parents and healthcare professionals when delivering unexpected news.

ASUM continues to invest in research grants to fund successful applicants in ultrasound-related clinical research. In addition, the group holds regular educational events in various formats, including webinars, hybrid events and in-person for professional development across a broad range of specialties.

ASUM Drive, provides a digital library of resources our members can access on-demand when most relevant to their needs. The Australasian Journal of Ultrasound in Medicine (AJUM), our peer-reviewed scientific journal, disseminates research and articles relating to ultrasound. Less formal communication such as direct mail, newsletters and social media further enable sharing of information, along with ASUM Connect, a forum connecting members to share and support each other.

#### SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN STATE OF AFFAIRS

There were no significant changes to the state of affairs of the group during the period.

#### OPERATING RESULT

The net result of the group for the financial year was a deficit of \$59,871 (2024: deficit \$257,001). The group is a not-for-profit entity and is only taxable on its income from non-members under the Principle of Mutuality.

#### REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

Likely developments in the group's operations and the expected results of those operations in the future financial years have not been included in this report as such information will likely result in unreasonable prejudice against the group.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATION

The group's operations are not regulated by any significant environmental regulation under a law of the Commonwealth or of a State or Territory.

The ASUM Board of Directors are committed to socially responsible investing, and we continuously evaluate and update our investment policies to align with our values. We believe our investment strategy should promote sustainability and positively impact society. Previously we have removed tobacco and gambling from our portfolio, reflecting our commitment to socially responsible investment.

We recognise further restrictions or changes on our investment may be necessary to fully align with our values. However, we must balance this with our fiduciary duty to our members. While we have implemented measures to exclude certain industries, we must consider the potential impact on financial performance, and work closely with our advisors to manage this. We will continue to monitor developments in the market and assess our investment policies accordingly.

#### LIMITATION OF MEMBERS' LIABILITY

The group is incorporated under the *Corporations Act 2001* as a company limited by guarantee. If the group is wound up, its Constitution states that each member is required to contribute a maximum of \$50 each towards meeting any outstanding obligations of the group. At 30 June 2025 the number of members was 2,321 and their collective liability was \$116,050.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

#### Note 1 - Corporate information

The financial report includes the consolidated financial statements and notes of Australasian Society for Ultrasound in Medicine (ASUM or the company) and its controlled entity ASUM Outreach Ltd (the group).

The financial statements were approved by the Board of Directors on 29 September 2025.

#### Note 2 - Basis of preparation

#### Statement of compliance

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in compliance with the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001 and Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures. The group is a not-for-profit entity for the purposes of preparing these financial statements.

#### Basis of measurement

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

#### Comparatives

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year. Where the group has retrospectively applied an accounting policy, made a retrospective restatement or reclassified items in its financial statements, an additional statement of financial position as at the beginning of the earliest comparative period will be disclosed.

#### Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The Directors evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the group.

#### Key estimates

#### Impairment - general

The Directors assess impairment at the end of each reporting period by evaluation of conditions and events specific to the group that may be indicative of impairment triggers. Recoverable amounts of relevant assets are reassessed using value-in-use calculations which incorporate various key assumptions.

#### Estimated useful lives of assets

The estimation of the useful lives of assets has been based on historical experience as well as manufacturers' warranties. In addition, the condition of assets is assessed at least once per year and considered against the remaining useful life. Adjustments to useful lives are made when considered necessary.

#### New and revised standards that are effective for these financial statements

#### New standards and interpretations not yet adopted

Certain new accounting standards, amendments and interpretations have been published that are not mandatory for 30 June 2025 reporting periods and have not been early adopted by the group. These include:

- AASB 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements (applicable for the year ending 30 June 2028)
- AASB S1 General Requirements for Disclosure of Sustainability-related Financial Information (applicable for the year ending 30 June 2026, depending on criteria qualification outcomes)
- AASB 52 Climate-related Disclosures (applicable for the year ending 30 June 2026, depending on criteria qualification outcomes)

It is not expected that AASB 18, AASB S1 or AASB S2 will have a material impact on the group in future reporting periods. AASB S1 and AASB S2 will only have mandatory application to entities required to report under Chapter 2M of the Corporations Act 2001 for annual reporting periods commencing on or after 1 July 2025. The group is currently assessing whether there will be any material change to disclosures in financial reporting in future years as a consequence of sustainability reporting requirements. As at the date of this financial report AASB S1 and AASB S2 do not have mandatory application to the group as the group prepares its financial report under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 financial reporting framework.

#### Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets and liabilities of the subsidiary of Australasian Society for Ultrasound in Medicine (parent entity) as at 30 June 2025 and the results of its subsidiary for the year then ended. Australasian Society for Ultrasound in Medicine and its subsidiary together are referred to in these financial statements as the "group".

The subsidiary is the entity over which the parent entity has control. The parent entity controls an entity when the parent entity is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the activities of the entity. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the parent entity. They are de-consolidated from the date that control ceases.

Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between entities in the parent entity are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of the impairment of the asset transferred. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the parent entity.

#### Note 3 - Accounting policies

The material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial report are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

#### Income tax

The group is a not-for-profit institution exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act* 1997.

#### Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

#### Revenue recognition

Amounts disclosed as revenue are net of returns, trade allowances and duties and taxes including goods and services tax (GST). Revenue is recognised for the major business activities as follows:

#### Membership fees and subscriptions

Revenue from membership fees and subscriptions is recognised on a straight line basis over the financial year. Any prepaid memberships are recognised under liabilities on the statement of financial position.

#### Grants, donations and bequests

Income arising from the contribution of an asset (including cash) is recognised when the following conditions have been satisfied:

- (a) the group obtains control of the contribution or the right to receive the contribution;
- (b) it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the contribution will flow to the group; and
- (c) the amount of the contribution can be measured reliably at the fair value of the consideration received.

#### Revenue from contracts with customers

The group derives revenue from the provision of services. Revenue is recognised as, or when, services are transferred to the customer and is measured at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the group expects to be entitled in exchange for the goods or service.

#### Sponsorship income

Sponsorship is recognised as revenue when received.

#### Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised as revenue on an accrual's basis.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of twelve months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash, and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value and bank overdrafts.

#### Trade receivables

For all sources of recurrent income, trade receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost, less provision for doubtful debts. Collectability of trade receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts which are known to be uncollectable are written off. A provision for impairment in relation to doubtful receivables is established when there is objective evidence that the group will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of receivables.

#### Property, plant and equipment

#### Recognition and measurement

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value, less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. Purchased software that is integral to the functionality of the related equipment is capitalised as part of that equipment. Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These are included in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

#### Subsequent costs

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

#### Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all relevant property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's expected useful life to the group commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Plant and Equipment

13% - 33%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period. An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

#### Right-of-use assets

At inception, a right-of-use asset and lease liability is recognised. Right-of-use assets are included in the statement of financial position within a classification relevant to the underlying asset.

Right-of-use assets are initially measured at cost, comprising of the following:

- The amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability
- Any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, less any lease incentives received
- Any initial direct costs incurred
- An estimate of costs to be incurred in dismantling and removing the underlying asset, restoring the site
  on which it is located or restoring the underlying asset to the condition required by the terms and
  conditions of the lease, unless those costs are incurred either at the commencement date or as a
  consequence of having used the underlying asset during a particular period

Subsequently, right-of-use assets are measured using a cost model. The right-of-use asset is depreciated to the earlier of the useful life of the asset or the lease term using the straight-line method and is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income in "Depreciation and amortisation".

#### Leases

The group leases office space. A lease is a contract, or part of a contract, that conveys the right to use an asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

At inception of a contract, it is assessed to determine whether the contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. If the terms and conditions of a contract are changed, it is reassessed to once again determine if the contract is still, or now contains, a lease.

#### Lease liability

At the commencement date of the lease, the lease liability is initially recognised for the present value of noncancellable lease payments discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the group's incremental borrowing rate. The tenor of a lease includes any renewal period where the lessee is reasonably certain that they will exercise the option to renew. The group has reviewed all its leases and included any extensions where the group assessed it is reasonably certain the lease agreement will be renewed.

#### Financial instruments

#### Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the group becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets this is equivalent to the date that the group commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset. Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transactions costs except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss" in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately.

Trade receivables are initially measured at the transaction price if the trade receivables do not contain a significant financing component.

#### Impairment of financial assets

The impairment requirements as applicable under AASB 9 use more forward-looking information to recognise expected credit losses. Expected credit losses are the probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of a financial instrument. A credit loss is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due, and all cash flows expected to be received, all discounted at the original effective interest rate of the financial instrument.

#### Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the group during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability. The carrying amount of trade and other payables is deemed to reflect fair value.

#### Income received in advance

Income that is received before the service to which the payment relates has been provided is recorded as a liability until such time as the service has been provided, at which time it is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

#### Employee benefits

Provision is made for the group's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may not satisfy vesting requirements. Those cash outflows are discounted using market yields on high quality corporate bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows.

#### Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result, and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.
